# **Psychology**

The Psychology major is a way to gain understanding of yourself and others through the study of the social, developmental, cognitive, and biological causes of behavior. The department prides itself on providing students with an applied approach to psychology through the study of current research and theories in the field. Psychology majors select one of four concentrations: General Psychology, Expressive Therapies, Human Services or Organizational Psychology. Psychology students learn psychological theory and conduct practical research with community partners. They participate in service-learning projects and off-campus learning experiences, as well as intern at a number of local organizations and schools. In the research practicum, students work with community partners to design and implement a research project. Through this actionoriented and experiential class, students work collaboratively and gain invaluable experience in the community.

# Sociology & Political Science

The Major in Sociology and Political Science (SPS) at Pine Manor College integrates sociology and political science into a single program of study. It has a central set of courses that emphasize understanding social and political systems from the neighborhood to the world. We see the place in all communities for activism and leadership. Core courses provide both foundational learning and common experiences integrating and applying learning in the major.

SPS majors complete one of four tracks, through which they integrate and define what the major means for them: Politics and Policy; Criminal Justice; Sociology; or International Development. SPS graduates are prepared for entry into a variety of fields, including law enforcement and other aspects of the criminal justice system, human services, politics and community organizing, or work in international business and development.

## **Community Health**

The greatest need in the field of Community Health is for people connected to diverse communities, rooted in these relationships, with linguistic and cultural skills. Our Community Health Major is designed to emphasize "competencies" in addition to specific knowledge gained from course work. Employers are eager to see what students can do, as they apply basic knowledge. On the basis of this evolving understanding, we have designed this major to be built on a small core of key courses that provide those specific knowledge needs, combined with a minor in one of many existing areas in the college curriculum. The goal is for students to gain a coherent knowledge through the core, but in the choice of the minor they decide the specific focus of their approach to issues in community health, and thus hone applicable skills. The public health core functions of assessment, policy development and assurance guide the majors in achieving foundational knowledge.







## Visual Arts

The Visual Arts major at Pine Manor College enables a student to emphasize either studio arts or art history in a selfdesigned type of major. A student takes a small number of required courses in these subjects, including a senior internship seminar and a senior thesis project, and selects one of two tracks in the major. A student and her advisor work very closely to select the electives in the major based on her interests and career goals. In addition, a student is also encouraged to take a broad range of courses outside the major which will complement her interests and career goals. A student may also register at nearby Boston College for additional courses. Creative thinking is at the core of the Visual Arts curriculum. Students develop creative and critical thinking skills in visual expression and writing, as well as a broad range of studio and design skills that will serve them well in the work-place.
